Each year the Sir Jules Thorn Charitable Trust offers a single award to support a programme of translational biomedical research. Each institution can submit one bid only and we are seeking outstanding applicants for this highly competitive award. Previous award winners include Professor Alison Simmons from Oxford (2011). The competition offers a grant of up to £1.5 million over a maximum of five years. 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And what's your role?

The aim of my role is to support Department Administrators with their budgets and forecasts. My focus for the last year has been in supporting departments by providing additional reports that enable them to more easily review their accounts. In addition, I have introduced processes which would have otherwise needed to be done by departments.

I hope over the coming year that I can work more closely with Department Administrators to identify other areas where I can support them. In particular, I would like to better understand more about departmental activities and how this is reflected in their accounts. My aim is to find more effective ways of working.

What's the longer term aim?

By working closely with departments I hope to share knowledge, aid communication and highlight common issues with the aim of finding solutions. I want to identify and promote good practice across all departments.

How did you get to where you are today?

I did my training at Oxford University Press where I held a variety of accounting roles. After I qualified as an Accountant, I worked as a Chief Accountant in the aviation industry for the last 12 years. During this time, I was responsible for the entire finance function and along the way ran a couple of major financial systems implementations.

What is life like outside work?

I spend most of my time horsing about, quite literally! I have a horse called Roy. He and I can often be found hacking around Shotover Park trying to avoid being chased by dogs or small children. We occasionally enter competitions and have won a rosette or two, although my golden rule is that if I can't jump it without the horse, I'm not doing it on the horse.



Board Business

In this regular feature, Dr David Bryan, Divisional Secretary, provides a summary of the Medical Sciences Board's activity

At its meeting on 24 June, the Medical Sciences Board:

(1) had a discussion with the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Planning and Resources) regarding the current review of the Joint Resource Allocation Methodology. The Board made clear that it would not welcome any proposals for changes if they would result in a move away from the allocation of income on an "as earned" basis.

(2) had a discussion with the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Planning and Resources) regarding the funding of the University's Capital Masterplan and agreed that it did not support debt-based funding for conventional projects.

(3) received a report on Athena SWAN developments and noted that there was a need to consider whether PDR discussions should become mandatory throughout the Division.

(4) received a report from the Board's Educational Policy and Standards Committee and agreed: that aspects of the proposal for a new MSc in Global Health and Tropical Medicine, including its name, required further consideration; that a proposed 1 + 3 programme in Global Population Health be submitted to Council's Education Committee for approval; and that a proposed part-time DPhil in the Nuffield Department of Population Health also be submitted for approval.

(5) received the report of the Board's Finance and Physical Capital Committee and agreed: to endorse the approach to the 2014– 15 divisional budget favoured by the committee including the introduction of rolling three-year projections and operational commentaries and the adoption of a recruitment protocol (the details of which are to be determined); to support a project to fit out space in OCDEM; and to create a Divisional Safety Officer for the clinical departments.

(6) received and noted the report of the Board's Research committee and in particular the progress in defining the content of the divisional Away Day in September and preparation for a visit, also to take place in September, by MRC Senior Officers.

(7) adopted a proposal brought forward by the Division's Information Security Working Group for the establishment of a divisional Information Governance Office that would co-ordinate and facilitate Information Security best practice.

Lab Talk

In this issue, we talk to Dr Molly Crockett, Sir Henry Wellcome Research Fellow in the Department of Experimental Psychology.

What topics are you pursuing in your lab?

We work on the neurobiology of human morality – what are the brain processes that enable us to care for the welfare of others? How are these processes compromised in mental illness? And how do we learn about the moral character of other people? We do behavioural and brain imaging experiments to investigate these questions.

We are a small group of six (looking to grow) from a mix of backgrounds including psychology, philosophy and neuroscience



Why do you think this is important?

People are profoundly social, and so much of our well-being depends on having healthy social relationships. Our relationships, in turn, depend on mutual care and concern for one another. Social relationships are often disturbed in mental illness. Our work aims to develop better tools for understanding how and when social relationships succeed and fail in health and disease.

How did you get to where you are today?

My undergraduate mentor, Professor Matt Lieberman at UCLA, introduced me to the fascinating world of social neuroscience and I've been passionate about it ever since. From there I pursued PhD studies at Cambridge, supported by a Gates Scholarship, and trained with one of the world's most eminent neuroscientists, Prof Trevor Robbins. The Wellcome Trust gave me the tremendous opportunity to spend my postdoctoral years collaborating with economists at the University of Zurich and neuroscientists at University College London working on human altruism. Together these experiences have provided me with a unique interdisciplinary approach to studying social cognition in health and disease.

What's a typical day like in the lab?

Depends on the day! If we're in a data collection phase, we'll spend most of our time programming experiments and interacting with study volunteers. Other times we'll be analyzing behaviour and brain imaging data, and writing about our findings for academic journals and public communication. We also travel quite a bit to present our work at conferences.

How has being at Oxford helped the work of your lab?

We've been very fortunate to be able to collaborate with philosophers at the <u>Uehiro Centre for Practical Ethics</u>. Prof Julian Savulescu and Dr Guy Kahane, experts in the philosophy of ethics, enrich our research programme by engaging in conversations about the ethical implications of our work.

Race Equality Charter Mark

The University of Oxford is one of 30 higher education institutions that have signed up to trial the Equality Challenge Unit's new race equality charter mark, demonstrating the University's ongoing commitment to equality and diversity. The race equality charter mark aims to tackle and prevent racial inequalities in the



same way that the Athena SWAN charter is tackling gender equalities. A recent <u>report</u> by the Campaign for Science and Engineering showed that black academics comprise just 0.2% of professors and 0.4% of researchers, despite making up 3.3% of the total population. 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Launch of Sanger Institute Fellowships

The Wellcome Trust Sanger Institute has launched the new Sanger Institute Fellowship which will help scientists who have taken a career gap. This postdoctoral Fellowship is designed to help scientists to return to scientific research after a career break of 12 months or more, for any reason. One fellowship will be awarded each year after a competitive selection process with applications linked to specific projects defined by Faculty members. Fellowships are for three years and can be worked full time, part time or flexibly.

This new Fellowship is a significant long term commitment by the Sanger Institute and is part of its ongoing commitment to supporting the career development of talented scientists via its Athena SWAN programme of work. While the Sanger Institute actively takes into account career breaks when assessing applications for all roles, this fellowship will be open exclusively to those who have taken a career break of 12 months or more.

Prize-winners' labs 'least likely to hire women'

A recent <u>study</u> published in *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences* has revealed that women are greatly underrepresented in the laboratories of the highest-achieving male biology professors in the USA. In labs run by female professors women made up 53% of grad students and 46% of postdocs but in labs run by men only 47% of grad students and 36% of postdocs were female. Labs run by male Nobel laureates are the least likely to hire women with twice as many male grad students than female and three times as many male postdocs than female.

A Resource to Raise Women's Visibility

<u>AcademiaNet</u> is a publicly available database providing biographical information on 1500 researchers and scholars. Only recognised scholarly associations can nominate candidates for the list, which are then vetted based on an agreed set of standards. To date, 39 organisations (including the Wellcome Trust) from 18 European countries have added names to the listing. The site is visited by 12,000 people each month and visitors include journalists, universities, hospitals, research organisations, companies and non-profit organisations. The database can be used to search for female academics in practically every field and provides a useful tool to find experts in a particular field, suitable candidates to fill a leading position or when considering prospective conference speakers.

We are faced with consistently above-inflation price rises for online journals. As a result, we don't renew any subscription without a careful review. We want to make renewal decisions in partnership and consultation with our users. We want to minimise the impact of any possible cancelations, making sure there is the necessary support for learning, research, and teaching within the MSD.

The following online resources are now due for renewal :

The total cost of these resources is £6757.87 but all have had very low usage in 2013/14 (see below).

Due to their very low use we have delayed renewing the subscriptions whilst we consult on their value with our community (please note that this isn't a notice of their permanent cancellation).

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New edition of Vesalius The Fabric of the Human Body to be exhibited

The Science and Health Care Libraries are pleased to announce that we are displaying a new edition of *De Humani Corporis Fabrica* (*The Fabric of the Human Body*), by **Andreas Vesalius** (1514 – 1564) – an annotated translation (2012) by D. H. Garrison and M. H. Hast.



Bodleian Libraries UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD It was purchased thanks to the generosity of donors, including the Friends of the Bodleian and Professor Alastair Buchan, and will initially be displayed in the **Cairns Library** at the John Radcliffe Hospital, before being transferred to the **Radcliffe Science Library**.

Vesalius is a major figure in medical history thanks to his ground breaking work in anatomy, and *Fabrica* is one of the most important books in the history of medicine as it fostered a radical shift in anatomical and medical thinking.

This new English translation is timed to mark the 500th anniversary of his birth, and incorporates the 1543 and 1555 editions as well as Vesalius' later annotations, showing the development of his thoughts and findings and which aspects of traditional knowledge he accepted and rejected.

Important Updates

Important information for all medical staff regarding revalidation

Message from Dr Tony Berendt, Responsible Officer and Interim Medical Director, Oxford University Hospitals NHS Trust, Oxford As you will know, all doctors with a licence to practice granted by the GMC are required to revalidate every 5 years. To do so they must create a **Prescribed Connection with a Designated Body** (for more information on the process and how to create a connection please visit the revalidation section of <u>www.gmc-uk.org</u>).

The Trust is currently experiencing an influx of requests to create a Prescribed Connection from doctors who are due to revalidate in the next few months. In some cases these doctors have been working with the Trust for many years and should have aligned themselves back in 2012 when revalidation became a legal requirement. Because a Prescribed Connection is governed by a doctor's personal circumstances it is not possible for the Trust to ascertain which doctors it is responsible for revalidating. The GMC is therefore clear that it is the doctor's responsibility to align themselves with the correct Designated Body. By not doing so a doctor is risking being classed as failing to engage with the revalidation process which ultimately could result in an administrative suspension of their licence and thus affect their ability to work in the UK. This represents a significant risk to the Trust as it is conceivable that a doctor working here could fail to revalidate due to not having connected themselves to a Responsible Officer and thus be unable to work when they are expected to. Late alignments also place a huge burden on the team administrating the process as there is a significant amount of "back office" work that needs to be done in addition to reviewing annual appraisals in order to prepare a revalidation portfolio. It is not only very difficult to do this at short notice but has a knock on effect on other recommendations due to be made around the same time.

Revalidation has now been in operation for 2 years and I therefore feel it is appropriate to expect that all doctors will have at least a rudimentary knowledge of revalidation including the requirement to create a Prescribed Connection. **To this end the way in which requests**

to create a Prescribed Connection will change from 1st September 2014 as follows;

- . Until 31st August 2014 any doctor with a legitimate Prescribed Connection may align themselves to the OUH without penalty
- From 1st September any doctor attempting to create a prescribed connection will not only be screened to ensure the validity of their request but to establish how long they have been employed by the Trust and in what capacity.
 - If a doctor has been employed for less than 3 months they will be counted as a "new starter" and no further action will be taken.
 - If they have been employed for between 3 and 6 months they will be referred to the relevant Clinical Director for a conversation of concern.
 - If they have been employed for between 6 and 12 months they will be referred to the relevant Divisional Director for a conversation of concern.
 - If they have been employed for more than 12 months I will have that conversation of concern with them personally as their Responsible Officer.

NIHR open access requirements update

NIHR have fleshed out their Open Access requirements since they last made an announcement in April. Please see some new main points below:

- "From the commencement of this policy (see above) the cost of APCs and other appropriate publication charges will be supported either through the original NIHR award, or where applicable an NIHR Open Access Fund. Researchers will need to contact the awarding NIHR Programme Coordinating Centre to review the correct approach. This does not apply to any recipient of NIHR funding prior to 1st April 2014, which remain under the requirements of their original contract."
- "None of the above should prevent NIHR funded authors from also depositing a copy in their own institutional or another subjectbased repository should they choose to do so or be required to do so by their employing institution subject to any restrictions from the publishers".
- "We therefore expect to see NIHR funded researchers working towards full compliance by 2017/18 with 100% of research papers funded by the NIHR published in journals that are compliant with the policy on Open Access."

Medical Research Fund

To support research conducted in the clinical departments of the Medical Sciences Division. Summer Long Vacation: Monday 28 July 2014 The Medical Research Fund supports research conducted in the clinical departments of the Medical Sciences Division.

Awards are made via three funding schemes towards the overall goal to promote work in the field of medical research and to extend medical research training opportunities.

The **bridging salary support scheme** accepts applications to augment existing externally funded research activity, by providing short-term (typically 3 months) funding to cover salary costs needed in order to retain experienced research staff between external research grants, and by providing a limited scheme to support maternity leave costs.

The **startup research funding scheme** accepts applications for small (up to £10k) awards in order to enable investigators to obtain pilot data to be used to support larger scale applications for external research funding in future. All non-staff research costs, including equipment, are eligible. Priority will be given to those applications that demonstrate matching funding from other sources. This scheme will not normally provide research support for students.

The **pre-fellowship scheme** accepts applications for short-term (up to 3 months) funding to cover the salary costs of clinicians who will shortly begin an externally funded research training fellowship at Oxford.

OxWATCH study now recruiting!

We are looking for women between the ages of 18 and 40 who are hoping to become pregnant with their first child, and have an Oxfordshire home address

The **OxWATCH Study** – a unique collaboration between the NHS and three departments of the University of Oxford: the Nuffield Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, the Department of Primary Care Health Sciences and the Cardiovascular Clinical Research Facility at the John Radcliffe Hospital – is the first of its kind to research the wellbeing and lifestyle of women planning a pregnancy in order to understand the likelihood of different diseases in later life. To build a full and detailed picture, thousands of young Oxfordshire women who have not yet started their families are invited to join the pioneering project.

Some women develop conditions such as diabetes, pre-eclampsia and depression during pregnancy. These women are more at risk of associated complications later in life. To better understand which women might







develop these conditions, we are measuring cardiovascular, metabolic and psychological health throughout the pregnancy and comparing them to those noted before.

Study participants will be asked to complete a wellbeing and lifestyle questionnaire and will have simple and easy measurements taken including a blood pressure, a blood test and a heart scan. The research team will then follow the women through any subsequent pregnancy and beyond.

The team hopes this will lead to better preparation for pregnancy, improved methods of preventing complications and earlier detection of problems when they do arise.

The OxWATCH team wants to recruit 300 women in the first pilot-phase and then expand the numbers to 12,000 women in Oxfordshire and other national centres.
