Returning Carers' Fund - call for applications

The Returning Carers' Fund is a small grants scheme intended to support the return to research of women and men who have taken a break of at least 6 months for caring responsibilities. Awards will normally be up to £5k. In exceptional circumstances, larger amounts may be awarded, up to an absolute maximum of £10k.

The fund is open to:

- All members of academic and research staff employed by the University, including those holding joint appointments but excluding those who have achieved full professorial title or hold statutory chairs
- All those who have either taken a single break of at least 6 months for caring responsibilities in the 2 years prior to 31 July 2014 or taken 2 or more breaks of at least 6 months each in the 5 years prior to 31 July 2014.

Support could include, but is not limited to: teaching buy-out; training or professional development; short-term secondments; conference attendance; short-term research or administrative assistance; funding visits to Oxford by research collaborator(s); and small scale lab equipment purchase.

Previously successful applications include:

- £4100 towards generating pilot data to support a fellowship application
- . £1400 to support conference attendance
- £4850 to support a 6-week visit to collaborators' labs (including travel costs and lab consumables in hosting labs)
- . £5000 to buy-out NHS clinical time

"Not for people like me?" Under-represented groups in science, technology and engineering

Women in Science and Engineering (WISE) have <u>published a report</u> that reviews recent research on the under-representation of women in STEM careers and suggests ways to encourage girls to undertake a STEM career.

The report finds that STEM careers are not popular aspirations for students age 10–14, who perceive that a career in STEM is 'not for people like me'. In order to overcome this perception the report recommends providing role models, peer support and mentoring, as well as describing the 'person spec' as well as the 'job spec' i.e. focusing on the types of people who succeed in science, technology and engineering rather than the jobs themselves. The report also suggests that employers need to provide a supportive work environment with flexible working options in order to retain female workers.

First wireless online exam a success for year 5 medics at the JR

Until recently all of the 50+ online assessments run annually within MSD as formal University exams, have required students to travel to an IT suite in the Science Area or the Rosemary Rue building on the Old Road Campus. With increasing pressure on IT suites and the demolition of the Rosemary Rue, this was becoming harder and harder to organise at the appropriate point in students' courses.

Funded in part by an MSD Teaching Excellence Project Award, <u>MSD Learning Technologies</u> (MSDLT) bought a set of 35 tablets (with keyboards) that can transported, along with their own secure wireless network, to any room suitable for an assessment with a University internet connection. During a pilot otolaryngology assessment to test the technology at the JR, in November, we established that, despite the smaller screen size, students preferred being able to take assessments without travelling to the Science Area.



The Community Based Subjects summative assessment for Year 5 medics in mid-December was sat by 27 students in Lecture Theatre 2 with no significant technical problems and paves the way for a wider roll out of wireless online assessments across MSD.

However, we're already exploring the use of our 'mobile learning spaces' in other situations, including:

- Polling/Audience Response in seminars/lectures
- Virtual microscopy alongside traditional histology teaching
- Objective structured clinical examinations

The Bodleian Libraries' winter exhibition celebrates the life and legacy of John Radcliffe, a physician and philanthropist who had uncanny success in diagnosing and treating his patients, including Queen Anne, and on his death left the bulk of his fortune to charitable causes.

The exhibition considers three buildings in the city which bear his name (the Radcliffe Infirmary, the Radcliffe Observatory and the Radcliffe Camera – the first circular library in Britain), and Radcliffe's ongoing legacy in the work of the Radcliffe Trust as it marks the 300th anniversary of his death.

Deadline: Saturday 31 January 2015 The objects of the charity are for:

"the raising of the standard of the Hospital or Hospitals concerned in order to assist the development and carrying on of the Oxford University Medical School".

Applicants should note that research projects are not normally funded (other than through Oxfordshire Health Services Research Committee (OHSRC).

The annual funds available are approximately £300,000 and bids are considered and grants awarded by the Trustees in May/June of each year. Recently grants have been awarded in the £20,000 to £40,000 range. The Trustees do not allocate grants for less than £5,000.

FameLab alumni have gone on to have successful media careers, for example British space scientist Maggie Aderin-Pocock, who has recently been awarded an MBE for her services to science, and evolutionary biologist Simon Watt who has gone on to present Channel 4's *Inside Nature's Giants.*

Regional heats will be taking place all over the UK in universities, museums, pubs, and festivals, ahead of the grand UK final on 22 April 2015 at the Bloomsbury Theatre, London.

British neuroscientist and Chair of The Times Cheltenham Science Festival Professor Russell Foster FRS said: "FameLab introduces us to the next generation of scientists who are not only addressing great scientific challenges, but are able to communicate what they do. In my view, it has never been more important to invest in science and, critically, communicate scientific progress to the broader non-scientific community."
